Epiphany

Epiphany is a Greek word meaning manifestation or appearance. At this time of year we prayerfully remember that God throughout salvation history has revealed himself to his people. This child Jesus will lead us to understand the mystery that God is one in three persons. There are three events that are linked because we begin to see Jesus who is clearly human revealing his glory as the only Son of God. They are the star leading the magi to the baby Jesus, the baptism of the Lord, and the wedding feast at Cana.

Whenever God is revealed in scripture and indeed in our own lives a response is expected. We are familiar with the gifts that the magi bring, gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Gold is a gift for kings; we of course know Christ to be our king. Frankincense was used for sacrifice to God; God created us to share in the divine love of the Trinity, so our whole lives should be an offering to God. Myrrh is used to prepare a body for burial; of course we know Christ died for our sins and rose so that through his death we might have life.

Being this solemnity falls early in the year affords us the opportunity to offer gifts to Jesus in the form of our resolutions for the New Year. St. Gregory assigned further meaning to the gifts in order that they may be our gifts. The gift of gold is wisdom. "Precious treasure remains in the house of the wise" (Prov. 21:20). The gift of frankincense is our prayers. "Let my prayer be incense before you" (Ps. 141:2). The gift of myrrh is the mortification of our flesh.

Wisdom is a gift of the Holy Spirit. We shine in God's sight with the light of wisdom when we are attentive to God's presence throughout the day and strive to trust what God is doing in the circumstances of our lives. How can we remember this year to be cognizant of God throughout the days?

The beginning of the year is a good time to review our prayer life. If the Eucharist is the highpoint of the Christian life how can our prayer prepare us for the liturgy on Sunday? Can we make it to Mass on one of the weekdays? What spiritual reading or practices should we take on for the year? Do we need to renew a goal of some quiet time with the Lord each day because we have become lax?

Mortifications, giving up some pleasures, are helpful only when we first are spiritually turning toward God and manifest this movement through some action or discipline. Are there some actions that will help increase within us the virtue of temperance? Will being healthier help us to realize we are temples of the Holy Spirit? Christ, the king of the universe became little and lay in a manger. What can we do that we may be more humble and therefore more Christ like?

Before I end, I want to make mention again of the Christmas collection. This week, because of your generosity, we surpassed what we had budgeted. As I write this article, our collection totals \$37,972.03.

Wise Men Still Seek Him

Matt 2:1-12

If I were going to go to visit someone in another town or city, I might first ask my GPS for directions. As good as GPS can be though, it isn't always exact. So just in case, I might then ask someone who knew how to get there to give me some directions. They could give me some general directions and they could recommend what roads that I should take and what signs to watch for. The next thing I might do would be to look it up on a map. The map would show me exactly how to get there. As I traveled, I would keep looking at the map so that I would know exactly where I was and where I was going. If I followed all the directions that I had received and used the map to guide me, I would surely find my way.

When Jesus was born a strange star appeared in the sky. In those days, it was the ancient belief that signs in the heavens foretold great--or terrible--things to come--depending on who is interpreting the sign. Some unusual movement or stellar event of great magnitude; like the star appearing, was often thought to herald the birth of a King or someone of great importance. So, when the star appeared, the Wise men from the east went looking. The fact that the star appeared and moved indicated more of a miraculous appearance than a natural one.

The Wise men believed the star heralded a new king and they wanted to find him so that they could worship and honor him. They went to Jerusalem and asked "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage.". The high priests and the scribes knew where Jesus was to be born, because it had been told by the prophet. They told the wise men that they would find the new King in Bethlehem. As you know, the wise men did not have GPS or a map to guide them to Bethlehem, but they had something even better. "And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was. They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh."

Did you know that even today, wise men are still seeking for Jesus?

We don't need a GPS or a map to help us find him -- we don't even need a star in the sky to help us find him. We can find our way to Jesus, the King, by reading God's Holy Word! The Bible is the best directions that will lead us straight to Jesus.

Dear Father, we thank you for the joy that Jesus brings. Help us to share that joy with everyone we meet and those who are seeking the one true King. In Jesus' name we pray, amen.

The Feast of the Epiphany is held 12

days after Christmas on January 6th. We celebrate Epiphany at church on the Sunday after New Year's Day, but we can celebrate it at home on the 6th as well. In some countries, presents are not distributed at Christmas, but at Epiphany because that is when the Wise Men, or Magi, brought gifts to the baby Jesus. The gift of gold represents Jesus' Kingship in Heaven, the frankincense recognized his Divine nature. We use incense to bless things and when we pray. The myrrh foretold his inevitable death as man.

Epiphany means 'an appearance or a showing'. Jesus was shown to the world, as a King, when the Magi found Him in Bethlehem. They had traveled a very long way, and so they represent the whole world looking for Jesus.

Jesus was shown to be the Son of God, at His baptism at the river Jordan. When his cousin, John the Baptist, baptized him in the river Jordan, the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove appeared over his head. A voice said; "This is My Son, in whom I am pleased."

Jesus was also shown to be Divine that means God Himself, when He changed water into wine at the wedding feast at Cana. This was Jesus first miracle.

One of the many traditions of Epiphany is the "Blessing of the House". Here is one simple form of this traditional blessings. The letters in the formula are from the first names of the Wise men who were the first to seek the true KING. The numbers that embrace the letters are the year. This is a great way to evangelize to all who enter and leave your home.

Epiphany Blessing of the House

As, 20 + C + B + M + 18, is written (with chalk) over each door in the house, the family, prays the following prayer:

Lord God of heaven and earth,
you revealed your only begotten Son to every nation
by the guidance of the star.

Bless this house and all who inhabit it.
Fill us with the light of Christ, that our concern for others
may reflect your love.

We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen

"The Sunday Eucharist is the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice. For this reason the faithful are obliged to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation, unless excused for a serious reason (for example, illness, the care of infants) or dispensed by their own pastor. Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin" (CCC 2180-2181).

"Anyone conscious of a grave sin must receive the sacrament of Reconciliation before coming to communion" (CCC 1385).

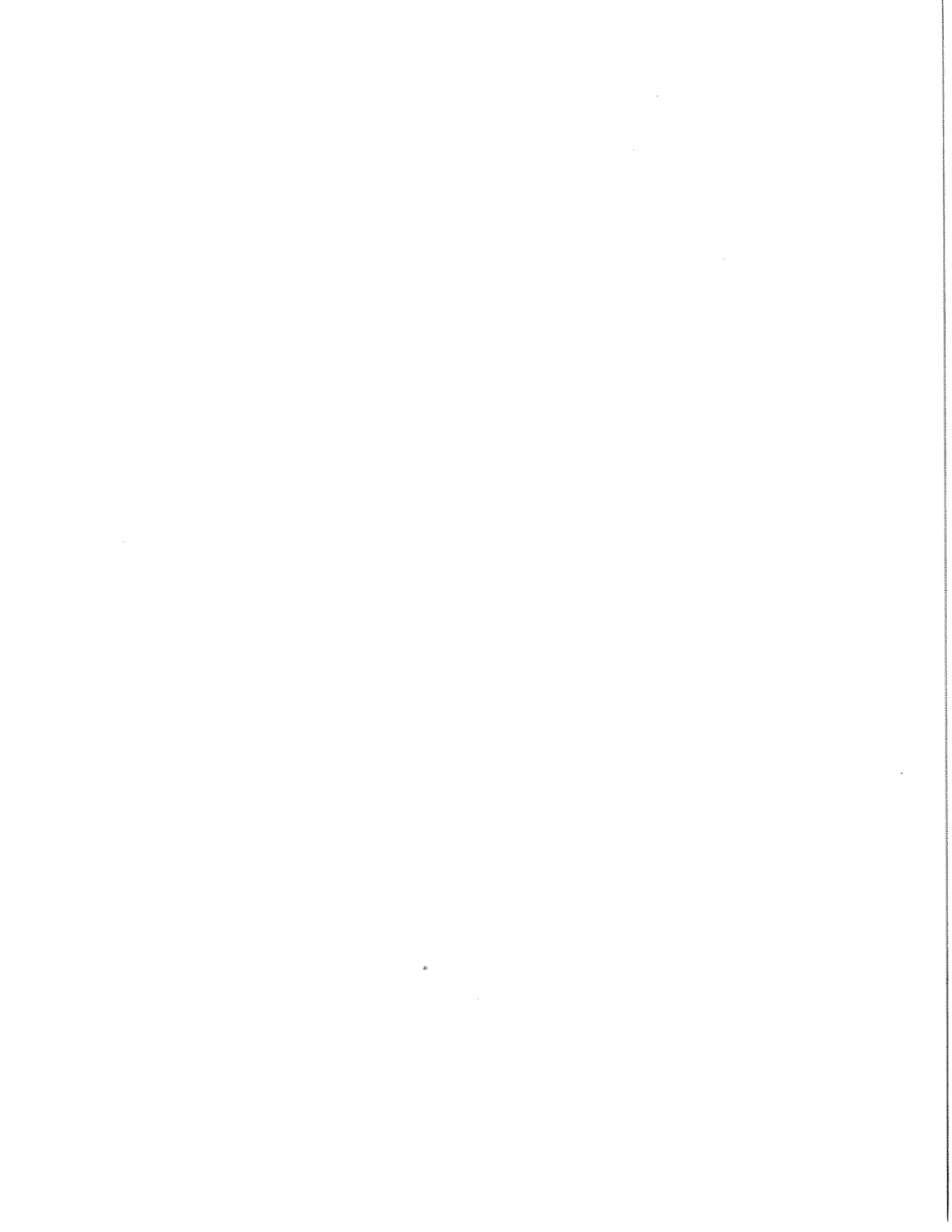

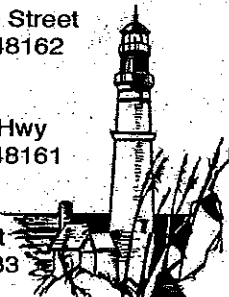
